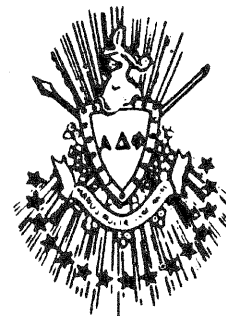

The Legacy Of Leadership Will Continue

The motion for a recount failing for lack of a second, I officially began my tenure as corporation president of Alpha Delta Phi at Cornell, Inc., on September 27, 1997. With the able assistance of fellow officers George Kennedy '52 as vice president, Peter Fifield '75 as treasurer, and David Faust '85 as recording secretary, the fine legacy of leadership and commitment to Alpha Delta Phi displayed by past President Ken Growney '82 will continue. The brotherhood owes Ken a debt of thanks for his many years of service as president and renewed support for him in his new position as chairman of the board. Our thanks also to Doug Bond '66 for his past service as chairman and his acceptance of the post of corresponding secretary, through which the board intends to broaden the scope of communication and fund-raising appeals to the brotherhood.

In a move aimed at fostering a closer working relationship between the active chapter and the corporation, the board of directors elected three officers/representatives from the active chapter to serve on a rotating basis as voting members of the board. This move should also improve continuity in carrying board policy forward from year to year as each active class graduates. A lack of continuity has been a source of some consternation in years past. The first active officers to serve in that capacity will be Justin Kaufman '98 (president), Bill Cornwell '99 (treasurer), and Adam Jacobs (assistant

rush chair). The positive attitude and spirit of cooperation displayed by the active chapter has never been stronger in my six years on the board, and I encourage Justin, Bill, and Adam to play an active role in the affairs of the corporation so these goals can be realized.

Thanks to the financial support of ACEF, the computer room renovation project is actively under way, as the steam and water piping in the room were relocated last summer, and proposals from architectural firms are slated for submittal. Joe Kujawa '91 was instrumental in the design development of this project, and I thank him for that effort. Barring further complications, the room renovation work should commence in June 1998.

The general building condition assessment report on the architectural, structural, and mechanical elements of the chapter house is in the final stages of completion and will be a major subject of discussion at the upcoming corporation/board meeting, which will be held once again at John Dyson's Millbrook Winery. Interior rugs and furnishings in the chapter house are generally in poor shape, but otherwise the physical plant and our code compliance status with the city of Ithaca have not been better in the six years that I can recall.

We are currently engaged in discussions with the university over a means of emergency access between Alpha Delta

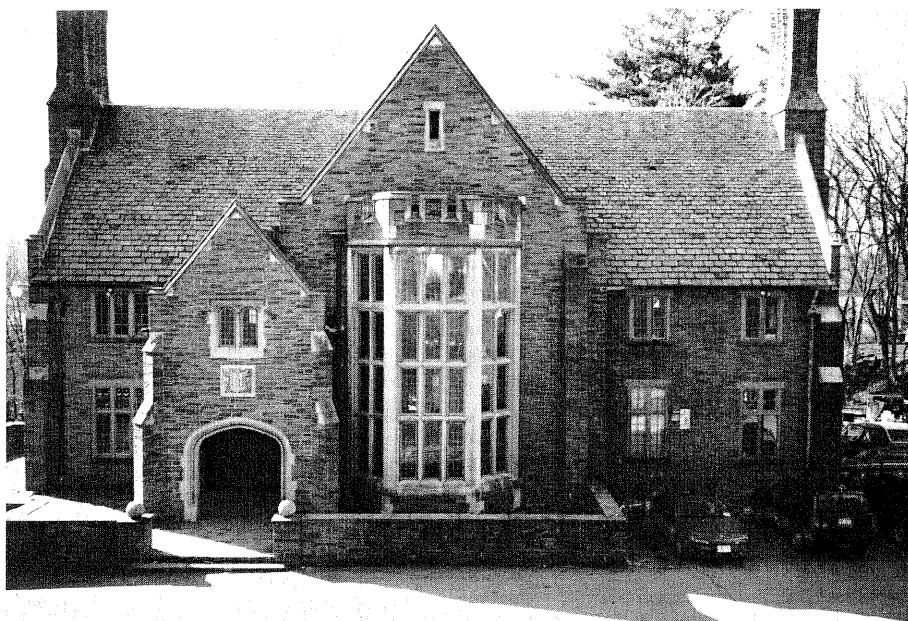
Alpha Delt Remains The Strongest House On The Hill

The 1997-'98 year represents a great challenge for the brotherhood of Alpha Delta Phi, while the fall semester has been filled with great accomplishments and hints of greatness for the semesters to come. Due to slowly declining rush numbers and the increase in popularity of abroad programs, the size of Alpha Delt has been somewhat reduced, yet this fact has not hampered the influence and good reputation that have been characteristic of the house for years. As the premier fraternity on the hill, Alpha Delt still exhibits all of the features alumni will recall with fondness and pride, features that the undergraduates strive to maintain for future generations.

While the physical structure of the chapter house remains impressive, a comprehensive engineering report completed over the summer outlined the safety improvements that will be needed in the coming years. The ACEF-sponsored study lounge and computer center is in the final planning stages and can be expected to be finished within a year. Replacing the aging computer room and laundry area will be a two-room complex with state-of-the-art computers, laser printers, scanners, faxes, and modem systems. The brotherhood is excited about the possibility of having a section of the house devoted to educational pursuits, eliminating the need to travel—sometimes in the harsh Ithaca weather—in order to find a comfortable work space.

The kitchen is in its best shape in years, with cook Mario Giacco fresh off of a summer job with a Cornell food science professor working with the U.S. RDA. New and healthier recipes, combined with a new flame grill, have made the culinary aspects of the house second to none among Greeks.

As mentioned earlier, the great challenge facing the brotherhood lies in the renewed emphasis on rush. The climate of the process has changed at Cornell; whereas in years past Alpha Delt could expect to attract its fair share of prospective rushees, a highly competitive environment requires new rushing techniques. This year the process started quite early, with freshmen frequently (yet informally) socializing with brothers as the school year began. The early start should result in a larger pledge class than in years past, bringing more top-quality brothers into the mysteries of the Alpha Delta Phi.

Undergrads Seek Large, "Cool" Pledge Class

As we all know, this is going to be an important rush year for Alpha Delta Phi. Last year we took only 14 pledges. In addition, many of the brothers are going to take a semester abroad in the spring. Numbers will be low, and it is crucial that we take a large class without sacrificing the social and academic integrity of Alpha Delta Phi.

At the alumni board meeting held over Homecoming, rush was a hot topic of discussion. The traditional disagreement between the active brothers and the alumni that has kept them from agreeing on the rush process was looked into. The actives have felt the need to take only "cool" rushees, whereas the alumni are mainly concerned with filling the house. One of the salient arguments of the alumni is that the house can be filled with brothers who will add to the diversity of the house and fill the actives' requirement of being "cool." This argument has been the foundation for this year's rush process. There are around 1,600 freshmen this year. There should be at least 25 of them who would make good Alpha Deltas (the criterion, of course, is being "cool").

With this in mind, the actives have

taken a progressive approach to rush this year. Some of the tactics of rush that have been used were brought up at the alumni board meeting at Millbrook Vineyards last spring. The first of these was having a strong fall rush. The key to a strong fall rush is meeting as many freshmen as possible in hopes that they will begin frequenting the house. If we can get freshmen to socialize at the house in the fall, we will have a solid basis for rush going into formal spring rush. The second is the use of the "face book" or freshman register. This list of freshmen can be used to associate faces with names as well as find hometowns. Other areas of importance have included marketing the fraternity and dispelling any misconceptions about the house.

Right now, rush is going well. We have about 15-20 names and numbers, with five to 10 freshmen frequenting house events. With the continued aggressive efforts of the actives, Alpha Delta Phi is poised to take one of its biggest and best pledge classes ever.

Alumni Relations To Focus On Brothers Helping Brothers

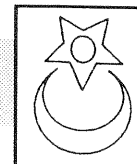

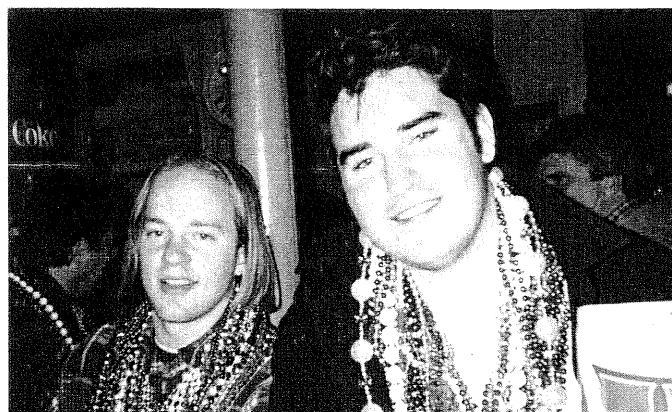
