A PERSPECTIVE ON "HAZING":

THE IMPLICATIONS OF THE WORD FOR FUTURE GENERATIONS

In the wake of various hazing incidents reported across the country in the past year—including a few that resulted in student deaths—Greek life at institutions of higher learning is once again coming under scrutiny by past and present participants, non-participants, and administrators. As an alumnus of Alpha Delta Phi at Cornell University, officer of the local chapter, member of the International Board of Governors, and 18-year, part-time risk-mitigation specialist in the ski industry (i.e., a ski patrolman), I come at this issue from a variety of perspectives. As an alumnus, I reflect back on the environment in which we operated (1977–1981) as a chapter and the types of activities/behavior that was considered "normal" and outside the realm of dangerous. As an alumni officer of the local chapter, I strive to see the traditions of Alpha Delta Phi continued and preserved for future generations while, at the same time, being regularly reminded of the exposure that participation brings. Working at the national level, I get to witness the commonalities and differences between chapters, across regions

and demographics, and between institutional administrations. Finally, I worked for years in an industry that, unfortunately, led the way in the '80s with landmark litigation that attempted (and succeeded) to assign "blame" to a business entity for the consequences of individual action(s).

With that foundation in mind, I have mixed feelings about the present state of affairs in the Greek community and the administrative responses to the unfortunate events that have taken place. While the loss of a life is never an acceptable outcome, neither are the irrational and purely emotional reactions that punish many for the actions of a few. At the core of this issue is the activity of "hazing," which, in turn, is typically associated with excessive alcohol consumption (what other excuse would anyone have for the poor judgment associated with these acts?). Underage drinking continues to be dealt with as a cause of much that is wrong rather than a symptom of other ills. We seem to have learned nothing from Prohibi-

tion and continue to believe that rules without a sensible basis will be followed just because they are rules, and then we are surprised when the responsive behavior is taken underground and exaggerated. This logic should also apply when we reasonably consider the actions and behavior that constitute "hazing." Typically, the behavior that manifests in most of the headlines is so clearly misguided that there is universal agreement on using "hazing" as the descriptor. However, then there is the "gray" area of "hazing," where disagreement and some intellectual discourse on the subject is possible.

At Cornell, there was a call to action by President Skorton in the fall of 2011 to end "pledging as we know it"—i.e., get rid of the hazing. The response to this call included the creation of a working task force known as R.A.R.E. (Recruitment, Acceptance, Retention, and Education). This task force recently conducted a webinar (which can be seen in its entirety at <http://www.youtube.com/watch?v=Vcn2IcUE9II>) that presented the recommendations it had made to the university administration. Much of the substance embodied in the work of the task force has value and would likely serve to enhance the Greek experience. However, there is still that slippery slope of what behavior constitutes "hazing." One of the slides was metaphorical for the difficulty in defining the term. In it, three definitions were summarized:

1) New York State Law (§120.16 & §120.17): "...creates a substantial risk of personal injury;"

2) President's Skorton's "A Call to Lead," CDS 8.29.2011: "... humiliates, intimidates, abuses, or endangers;" and

3) Cornell Campus Code of Conduct (Article II.A.1.f): "... endangering the physical health of an individual or causing mental distress." I have taken the liberty of loosely ordering these from the narrowest to the broadest definition—in my opinion, "mental distress" covers much of our daily lives, including the educational experience of Cornell.

Ultimately, the success of any program that looks to stem the tide of "hazing" will be largely dependent on the scope of the behavior attributed to the term—the broader and more encompassing the definition, the less likely it is that students will be willing to follow the rules. Speaking for myself (although I am sure many others will agree), the experiences of my life during which I felt some degree of "mental distress" are those that I consider to be periods of valuable learning and growth. I hope this effort to "end pledging as we know it" doesn't take away the opportunity for substantive learning and growth from a generation that so desperately needs it.

This year, Victory Club worked with the global support group, Voices of African Mothers (VAM), to hold an event that not only expanded our philanthropic boundaries, but also our exposure on campus. The founder of VAM, Nana-Fosu Randall, kindly joined the brothers of the Phi for the event and spent the rest of her time on campus touring the school to speak with students about her initiative. Alpha Delta Phi teamed up with a conglomerate of on-campus service organizations, including Big Red Relief, to organize these educational events.

Victory Club itself was an enormous success and was essentially Mrs. Randall's main event. This year, Victory Club featured a jazz ensemble, an *a capella* group, a toast from Mrs. Randall, gambling, and a set by DJ Greg Monte. Overall, the event exceeded its fundraising goals through various advertising means, as the attendees represented a diverse demographic of both Greek and non-Greek students. Garrett Loh '13 and Luis Arturo Corzo '14 were this year's Victory Club chairmen. They have made many expressions of their sincerest gratitude to the brothers and alumni who made this event possible—especially the philanthropy chair, Samuel Ritholtz '14, who performed an indispensable role in advertising the event to the Cornell community.

ALPHA DELTS CONTINUE OUR TRADITION OF PHILANTHROPY

This year the Phi, following the pillar of service, has done much work to give back to our local and global communities. In September of 2011, we focused on our Cornell community and organized a banquet in honor of one of our own—fellow Cornellian Ingrid Nuñez '14, who is a friend of many brothers and was diagnosed with stage IV lung cancer during the summer of 2011. To raise money for her cancer treatment, we hosted a banquet at the Phi with help from our friends at Sigma Chi and Kappa Alpha Theta. The event was well attended and raised over \$5,000.

Extending our sights to the Ithaca Community, we worked with the multicultural sorority, Delta Sigma Theta, to raise money for its scholarship fund. The Rosario Alvarez Scholarship provides funding for a high-achieving female minority student with financial need to attend a four-year university. Last year's winner actually attended Cornell and is a good friend of mine. To raise money for the scholarship, we sponsored two open "after-hours" parties, one in the fall and one in the spring. The parties raised \$1,300 and \$1,100, respectively, and thus added \$2,400 more to our total philanthropy dollars raised.

Following our community-focused events, we began to concentrate on issues affecting everyone and teamed with the Cornell Sustainability Hub to host the kick-off event of their campus-wide initiative, Campaign to Sustain Us. Although we did not raise money for a specific cause, we helped start this conservation campaign off right.

Lastly, in April, the brothers of Alpha Delta Phi hosted three different events to raise awareness and funds for causes affecting our global community. Our first event, titled "Bid Night for Bed Nets," was a date auction with the on-campus club Cover Africa to raise money to purchase bed nets, which help fight malaria in Ghana. Our second event was a rave sponsored by Life Changing Apparel. Proceeds for this event went towards medical

supplies for a hospital in Nicaragua.

Our final philanthropic endeavor for the year was our annual Victory Club. This year, the proceeds for Victory Club went to the Voices of African Mothers (VAM). VAM creates self-sustaining eco-villages for women and children refugees affected by war and conflict in Sub-Saharan Africa. I have the honor of representing this organization as a Youth Ambassador at the United Nations and have personally become very devoted to the cause. The brothers of the Phi are also exceptionally honored this year to announce that the founder of the organization, Nana-Fosu Randall, joined us at the event, along with other members of the board of directors, including Jeff Furman, chair of the board of directors of the Ben and Jerry's Foundation and one of the founders of Ben and Jerry's.

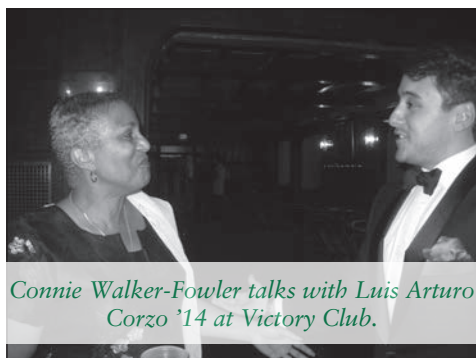
Nana-Fosu Randall is a career diplomat at the United Nations and, when she formally retired as the chief financial officer of the United Nations Peacekeeping Operation, she was the highest-ranked African woman in the United Nations system. To fully take advantage of Nana's visit and in the spirit of our founding as a literary society, the Victory Club chairs and I worked diligently to plan numerous events on campus for the good of our brotherhood and the Cornell community. We hosted a fireside chat with campus leaders and Nana. She also went to dinner with fellows from the Public Service Center. On Saturday morning of Victory Club weekend, Nana met with the sisters of the multicultural sorority, Delta Sigma Theta. At that evening's Victory Club, the entire community celebrated the work of her organization. Finally, we concluded with a brunch on Sunday with Taverna Banfi, brothers of the Phi, and the Cornell Institute for Public Affairs. We very much enjoyed her visit and Victory Club itself!

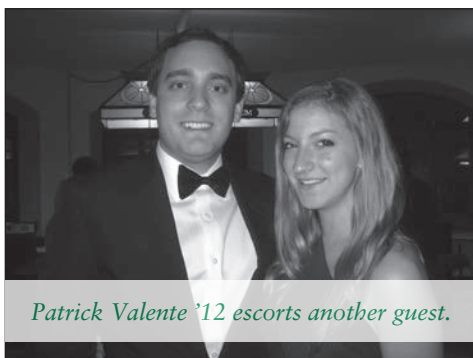

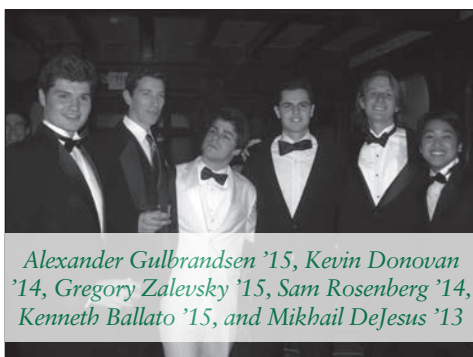

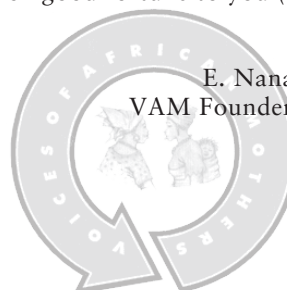
It is through the tremendous generosity and support of individuals and orga-

SAMUEL RITHOLTZ '14 JOURNEYS TO AFRICA FOR SUMMER RESEARCH IN TANZANIA AND ZANZIBAR

Much to the chagrin of my overprotective mother, I will be embarking on the adventure of a lifetime this summer. As a double major in economics and Africana studies, it should come as no surprise that I will be spending 10 weeks exploring the western and eastern regions of Africa. Although I will be taking advantage of opportunities that Cornell has provided for me during much of my trip, I will also spend some time on experiences of my own devising.

My trip begins in Washington, D.C., from where I will fly through Addis Ababa, Ethiopia, and finally arrive at my first destination: Kilimanjaro International Airport, Moshi, Tanzania. For the first eight weeks of my summer, I will be based in Moshi, Tanzania, at the base of Mount Kilimanjaro. During my first four weeks in Moshi, I will be taking a class and conducting research at the Kilimanjaro Christian Medical Center with my fellow Cornell students, as well as Tanzanian medical students. The class will be about global health issues affecting Tanzania and their impact on the local community. My research will involve choosing a specific issue in public health and analyzing its effect on the Moshi community.

I will remain in Moshi for four more weeks as a teacher at a school for street children and children with special needs. Everyone's internship

in the program is different, but is based on our skills and interests. Because of my extensive history working with children with disabilities, I will be placed in the school for street children, creating curricula and behavior-management plans for teachers to follow for years to come.

During my eight weeks in Moshi, I plan to visit the various game reserves and national parks that the area is known for. I will also visit typical tourist villages, such as Arusha, and—depending on how bold I am feeling (and how much I train)—I may even consider climbing Mount Kilimanjaro. Much of how I spend my leisure time will not be decided until I get there, but I do expect to spend a fair amount of my time with wild animals that I probably should not be near.

After my eight weeks in Moshi, I will be traveling to the tropical island of Zanzibar with other members from my program. Zanzibar is a veritable paradise known for its beaches and ancient Swahili villages. I look forward to exploring the natural and manmade parts of the island while also practicing my Swahili. Although it is supposed to be my "week off" during the summer, I will most likely be volunteering in a orphanage on the island, as I cannot be on a beach for too long without going crazy. After five days in Zanzibar, I will be meeting my peers in Dar es Salaam

to view the Tanzanian operations of our Victory Club charity, Voices of African Mothers.

After my time in Dar es Salaam and Zanzibar, I will board a plane and fly to Accra, Ghana, in western Africa. I will be there for nine days with a few other Cornell students, and we will be observing the Ghanaian operations of Voices of African Mothers. We will be staying in the villages with the women and children, learning about how the village runs and brainstorming ways for how village life can be improved. Upon returning to Cornell, we will be designing a global service-learning trip available to Cornell students interested in social entrepreneurship and entrepreneurship for change.

While I am incredibly excited for my trip this summer, I am also a bit nervous. This will be my first time traveling in the developing world, and I do not expect things to be easy. In fact, my experience filming a documentary in Amsterdam this past summer pales in comparison to what I am about to take on this summer. With all this said, I know there is no better time for me to do this, and I look forward to the challenges awaiting me.

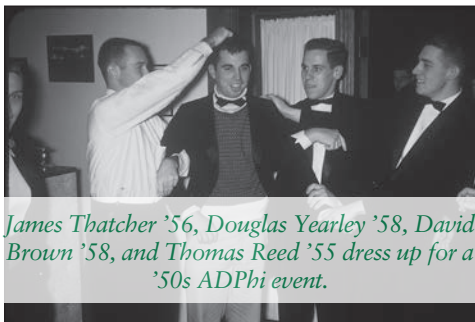

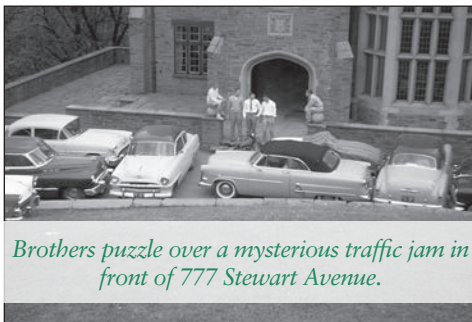

Robert H. “Bob” Herrmann ’41 died on May 23, 2011, of heart disease in Cockeysville, Maryland. Herrmann was born and raised in Garden City, New York. He earned bachelor’s degrees in chemistry in 1941 and chemical engineering in 1942. In the army during World War II, he attained the rank of captain, commanding troop transports to France and Italy. He moved to Baltimore in 1948, when he was hired by Davison Chemical Company as technical director of a silica gel project. In 1958, Herrmann went to work for W.R. After Texas Instruments produced a form of the chemical that was 10-times more pure than its competitors’ products at half the cost, Herrmann joined Thiokol Chemical Corporation, where he spearheaded sales of solid-fuel rocket boosters to NASA. “During trips to Cape Canaveral to view launches, he met astronauts Gus Grissom and John Glenn, as well as Vice President Lyndon Johnson,” said his son, R. Leith Herrmann. From 1974 until 1993, when he retired, Herrmann worked for Teledyne National and National Ecology, establishing recycling plants in Palm Beach, Florida, and other U.S. cities. He enjoyed woodworking and was an accomplished watercolorist. Herrmann also liked to ski and was a world traveler.

Paul Micou ’48, of Montclair, New Jersey, died on Sunday, July 17, 2011. Micou was born in Detroit, Michigan. After graduating from Cornell, he attended Michigan Law School. Micou also served with the First Marine Division in China in 1945. Richards was the founder and owner of Orchard Hills Athletic Club for nearly 40 years, founder and director of the International Health and Racquet Sports Association, and founder of the North Central Massachusetts Boys & Girls Club, which reaches out to over 400 youngsters in the communities of Leominster and Fitchburg. He was also a former trustee of the Community Foundation of North Central Massachusetts and Fitchburg Art Museums, and former director of both the North Central Massachusetts Chamber of Commerce and the Fay Club in Fitchburg. Richards was very passionate about astronomy, hiking, tennis, and running marathons. He ran his first of 17 marathons at age 57, and at age 60 he successfully hiked to the summit of Mt. Whitney in the Sierra Nevada. He will long be remembered for all he was and the amazing things he did.

Thomas K. “Bear” Allison Jr. ’67—president of Allison Systems Corporation and its blade systems division, Allisontech Sales, passed away unexpectedly on January 21, 2012—at Community Medical Center in Toms River, New Jersey. customers’ presses. Tom also pioneered the use of new high-tech materials for blades, including QR and QRH tool steels, fiberglass, and graphite. Tom’s wife, Eve English Allison, will succeed him as president of Allison Systems. Eve has extensive experience with the overall management of the company, and has long managed Allison Systems’ extensive inventory of precision steel, specialized plastic, and advanced composite materials.
